The real-life couple's personal chemistry segues into their performances. If we dare say that rookie Subodh's matched veteran Nandita's, the latter can share the glory. He may have trained for this debut with Waman Kendre and Mahesh Dattani, but the director is important, no?

We also enjoyed the after-party at Amadeus next door because, while it featured many of Glambai's familiar faces, they were clearly here as actors, activists and most important of all, long-time buddies Nandita and Sub-
